Although clean air is a micro step in terms of the entire project, let's celebrate even our most modest successes. The crews of Gerken Environmental Enterprise and ACM Removal completed the work in just over 6 days. Of course, we still have a west basement that only a mother could love – BUT, the pipes, joists, and beams are mold and asbestos free.

Heikes Construction began repair of the North Wall on April 30. After a thorough power washing and "chasing and filling" the cracks, the

wall will enjoy a new coat of elastomeric paint.

I WISH I could give you a start date for the basement dewatering and structural repair. We are on the home stretch, but are still struggling with aligning the cost of the project with our budget. The bids continue to come WAY over budget. Thank goodness for Roger Heckert, Mike Joyce, Tim McNally, and Mary Kate Sullivan, our Construction Oversight Team, who face these challenges with positive "let's find a way to get this done" attitude and the experience to keep us moving forward.

The Sting (abridged)

This is wonderful entertainment in the old Hollywood studio

tradition and a perfect beginning for this series. *The Sting* (1973) is the second film teaming up Paul Newman and Robert Redford with director George Roy Hill and producer Darrell Zanuck Jr. Their first, *Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid* (1969), was a celebration and debunking of the myth of the Wild West at the end of the lawless frontier. *The Sting* is set during another lawless age, the depths of the Depression, when the mob had the law over a barrel thanks to prohibition and bribery.

This film has been a favorite of mine and I always find new things to enjoy when I catch it again. I would like to recommend several other movies for those who share my enthusiasm . . .

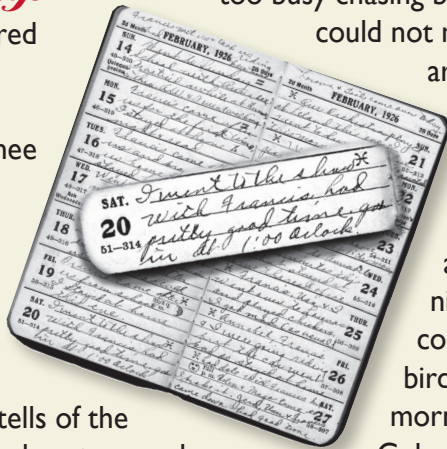

Many of you have shared your memories of the Saturday matinees. According to one matinee fan, the admission was nine cents (in the 50s), and for that you could see the double feature, news reels, and weekly serials such as *Sky King*. The memory tells of the Colonial Fox as a great place to spend time with friends, enjoying that buttery popcorn, Jujubes, and malted milk balls. One movie attendee wrote that she came to the Colonial Fox in the 1960s for the five cent frozen pickles and cups of pickle juice. She also got to see a local band perform one Saturday. Another woman could care less about the sweet and sour treats. She was



too busy chasing boys. She exclaimed, "I could not miss a Saturday." She arrived each week with her girlfriends to meet the boys and then stay for the late show, which got out around midnight. These night owls didn't have a corner on the fun. Early birds enjoyed Saturday morning stage shows at the Colonial Fox. An individual who attended the Colonial Fox in the 1940s explained to us that you could participate in a cracker eating contest and see a movie for twenty five cents. The contest required one to eat four crackers and then whistle. Luckily this girl was able to squeak out a sweet tweet. She won a Roy Rogers cap pistol and holster for her "airs."

Theatre Vocabulary

Dolly

Have you ever wondered how tumbleweeds roll across the stage during a shootout or how a train can emerge from the wings and disappear down the tracks? How does that pirate ship cross the bounding main? WELL, to simulate the motion needed for these effects, pieces of equipment, known as a dolly and a dolly track, are used. The Colonial Fox Theatre has her very own *dolly* and *dolly track*, carefully stored under the stage, left over from her vaudeville days! Dollies (both with and occasionally without tracks) are still used today to move props and foreground/background elements. The modern dolly is also a method for controlling the movement and location of a camera in today's film production. On film sets, dollies are used for tracking or following shots. They can be as simple as a small cart equipped with a boom microphone and a steady-cam or as elaborate as rigs with hydraulic arms and seats for a driver.
